### IN THE LANGUAGE CENTRE YOU CAN:

- Study any of 120 languages available from beginners' to advanced level. New acquisitions are listed regularly on the web.
- View direct broadcasts by satellite currently available daily in Arabic, Dutch, French, German, Greek, Indic languages, Italian, Japanese, Persian/Iranian, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Scandinavian languages and Turkish. Recordings of satellite programmes are made every night.
- Watch *films in foreign languages*, many with sub-titles. See also some reference material on films (e.g. Cannes CD-ROM). There is also a comprehensive collection of *literary and cultural programmes* on audio and video tapes.
- Use the *multimedia workstations* for language learning programmes, CD-ROM material (dictionaries and literature databases), digital television, and other on line resources, plus links to external language resources including newspapers and courses abroad.
- Consult an adviser to discuss your learning needs and plan your individual programme. An adviser is available during full term in the Independent Learning Centre
  at times to be announced.
- Enter into conversation exchange with a speaker of the language you are learning.
- · Join language courses for academic purposes which are run during term time and in the summer vacation in German, Russian, Japanese and French.
- Find *information* about language courses abroad, details of language bursaries and scholarships, international summer schools and summer jobs abroad, consult reference books and directories. Some of this information is available via the Centre's home-page.

### The Teaching Laboratory

Is used for classes, which are listed in the Lecture List of the Faculties concerned. It has been designed to be a flexible teaching and learning environment, catering for up to 24 students. It is equipped with 24 audio-active-comparative booths linked to a teacher's console, each booth is equipped with a video monitor which can receive live or recorded satellite programmes, or live CCTV images from the teacher. There is also an OHP available, plus a large 4 ft wide screen video/data projector connected to a multi-media PC and the Language Centre TV and data network for whole class teaching.
