Students are advised to begin work during the Long Vacation period of residence.

The course is organised on an option system. Students will take two options out of five (Cellular Pathology, Immunology, Microbial and Parasitic Disease, Virology and Genetic Pathology). Detailed information on these options is available in the Department of Pathology.
