#### PROGRAMME OF PROFESSIONAL TRAINING FOR RESEARCH STUDENTS (PHD)

Students in their first year of research should attend the seminars on library resources; the other seminars may be followed over the course of the second and third years, although first-year students are welcome to take part too.
