



The Faculty also draws Students' attention to the Joint Schools' Copurses on 'Research Methods in the Social Sciences'.

The courses exists to promote the cooperation between the Social Sciences Departments at Cambridge University in the training of researchers. There are two components of the training offered. First, M.Phil. courses of research training. These are courses that are common to several Social Science M.Phil. degrees which are taught through the Joint Schools Initiative. These courses are formally examined and are intended to lay the grounding of research training for students intending to go on to a Ph.D. These courses can be attended by Ph.D. students provided there is space available.
