#### Self-Teach Computer Training Courses

In addition to the programme of formal courses, a selection of self-paced training material is provided for loan, or in some cases purchase, from Computing Service Reception, New Museums Site, Pembroke Street. A deposit of £50 is required for courses which are borrowed; this usually takes the form of a cheque which is returned when the material is brought back on time and in good, fully usable condition. Some courses require a specific version of the software to be installed on the computer being used; in some but not all cases Computing Service facilities may be used. As with most commercial software, there are licence restrictions which forbid copying of courseware, unless expressly permitted.
