The proposals in the Joint Report were approved by Grace 5 of 15 February 2012. The Council gives notice that the regulations have been adopted and approved with effect from the date of this Notice. The Joint Report also included a draft publication scheme to advise the University of building works which were not substantial enough to require a Report. The scheme is republished below for the information of the University.

Publication of building works (including refurbishment or restructuring) which are not substantial: Notice

Where the Committee responsible for giving an Expenditure Approval considers that an alteration is not substantial (see *Reporter*, 2009–10, p. 676, para. 10), the Committee will consider if the works, though not needing a Grace, are nevertheless of interest or consequence to members of Regent House, other members of the University, members of the public or friends of the University such that publicity is appropriate.

This includes (but is not limited) to alterations to sites or buildings of architectural, artistic or historical interest or which are open to the public.

The Committee will consider if Standard Publicity should be given; if the circumstances require more or different publicity; or if there should be no publicity.

Standard Publicity

Notice will be posted, normally at least 14 days before work is to commence (in urgent cases the period may be less), in the following ways:

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REGULATIONS FOR EXAMINATIONS

The General Board give notice that, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board or other authority concerned, the regulations for certain University examinations have been amended as follows:

Examination in Public Policy for the M.Phil. Degree

On the recommendation of the Degree Committee for the Faculty of Human, Social, and Political Science, the General Board have approved Public Policy as a subject for advanced study for the M.Phil. Degree (one-year course), **with effect from 1 October 2013**. Special regulations for the examination in the subject have been approved as follows:

PUBLIC POLICY

1. The scheme of examination for the one-year course of study in Public Policy for the degree of Master of Philosophy shall consist of:

- (a) three case studies on topics announced by the Degree Committee for the Faculty of Human, Social, and Political Science; each case study shall be examined by a written paper and by an essay of no more than 2,000 words in length;

and

- (b) a report on a work placement approved by the Degree Committee for this purpose;

and

- (c) a thesis of not more than 15,000 words in length, including footnotes, appendices, and bibliography, on a topic approved by the Degree Committee.

2. The examination shall include an oral examination on the work submitted by the candidate under Regulation 1 above, save that the examiners, may at their discretion, waive the requirement for an oral examination.

Examination in Biological Science for the M.Res. Degree

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 516)

With immediate effect

The scheme of examination for the one-year course of study in Biological Science for the degree of Master of Research has been amended to allow for additional requirements for the examination (including a Multiple Choice Question paper). The regulations have been amended by inserting the following sentence after the first sentence:

The Degree Committee shall, at the same time, specify any other exercises which form part of the examination for candidates in particular subjects.

BIOLOGICAL SCIENCE

The scheme of examination for the one-year course of study in Biological Science for the degree of Master of Research shall consist of a portfolio of research reports, of not more than 20,000 words in total, exclusive of tables, footnotes, bibliography, and appendices, on a theme and of a form approved and published annually in the Easter Term before the commencement of the course by the Degree Committee for the Faculty of Biology. The Degree Committee shall, at the same time, specify any other exercises which form part of the examination for candidates in particular subjects. The examination shall include an oral examination on the work submitted by the candidate and on the general field of knowledge within which such work falls. The portfolio shall provide evidence to satisfy the Examiners that a candidate can design and carry out an original investigation, assess and interpret the results obtained, and place the work in the wider perspective of the subject.

REPORTS

Report of the General Board on the establishment of a Professorship of General Practice

The GENERAL BOARD beg leave to report to the University as follows:

1. The School of Clinical Medicine pursues its mission of medical education and research in close collaboration with its NHS partners, and identifies research themes which will link key areas of biomedical science with relevant clinical problems of importance to the health service.

2. General Practice as a clinical discipline is at the centre of healthcare delivery. General Practitioners are responsible for medicine in the community and, increasingly, play a significant role in the commissioning of secondary and tertiary care, i.e. hospital-based medicine.

As an academic discipline, General Practice is concerned with research in areas as diverse as behavioural research (e.g. in relation to exercise, nutrition, and smoking), health services research (e.g. in relation to the effectiveness of particular configurations of services for healthcare delivery), and translational medicine (e.g. designing community based health interventions). General Practice is also a core part of the undergraduate medical curriculum, with a significant proportion of medical graduates destined for careers in General Practice.

3. The School of Clinical Medicine has considerable strengths in General Practice through its General Practice Unit in the Department of Public Health and Primary Care and its Institute of Public Health. Although strong, the Unit is small by national standards, and indeed has failed to reach the critical mass required for membership of the National School for Primary Care. The School of Clinical Medicine has taken steps to expand the Unit in order to address this weakness, having appointed three new Professors and one Director of Research since the 2008 RAE. However, the retirement in 2011 of Professor Ann Louise Kinmonth from her Professorship of General Practice has reduced the strength of the Unit, and the NHS funds which supported her appointment lapsed at the end of her tenure.

4. The Faculty Board of Clinical Medicine consider that it is important to re-establish a further single tenure Professorship of General Practice to allow a replacement

6. The General Board recommend:

That a Professorship of General Practice be established in the University, for a single tenure from 1 June 2012, placed in Schedule B of the Statutes, and assigned to the Department of Public Health and Primary Care.

The Faculty Board will provide support and facilities for the work of the Professor from within existing resources.

END OF THE OFFICIAL PART OF THE ‘REPORTER’

REPORT OF DISCUSSION

Tuesday, 6 March 2012

A Discussion was held in the Senate-House. Pro-Vice-Chancellor Professor Jeremy Sanders was presiding, with the Registrar’s Deputy, the Senior Proctor, a Deputy Proctor, and three other persons present.

The following Reports were discussed:

Report of the General Board, dated 8 February 2012, on the establishment of a Professorship of Sustainable Reaction Engineering (*Reporter*, 2011–12, p. 456)

No remarks were made on this Report.

Report of the General Board, dated 8 February 2012, on the establishment of Professorships of Politics, Engineering and Genetics (*Reporter*, 2011–12, p. 457)

Dr C. J. O’KANE (Head of the Department of Genetics):
Mr Deputy Vice-Chancellor, in 1912, the Balfour Professorship of Genetics was established in Cambridge – to my knowledge, the first Chair in Genetics anywhere in the world. In the hundred years since then, Genetics has changed the way we do biology, and even the way we see ourselves as humans. The contribution of Cambridge geneticists to this has been substantial – and so we will have much to celebrate at our centenary symposium on 7 September this year.

However, this is also a time for looking forward. Genetics continues to contribute enormously to biology, for example as a result of the current ten-fold increase in the capacity of DNA sequencing every 18 months. I enthusiastically welcome the establishment of this Professorship, as an investment in the future of Genetics in

Cambridge, and in the power of Genetics to advance our understanding of biology.

Professor G. R. EVANS (Emeritus Professor of Medieval Theology and Intellectual History) (read by the Senior Proctor):

Mr Deputy Vice-Chancellor, those who are old enough in academe to remember the New Blood appointments of a generation ago, the last time there was serious Government financial cutback in higher education, will also recall that they had the effect of unbalancing provision. As far as I can remember, it was a requirement that the appointee, normally a young academic just getting started, must be able to offer something ‘new’. The something new, however interesting in itself, was not necessarily always in proportion to the needs of a Department, however glad it might be to get an extra academic.

The stated purpose of the unusual device proposed in this Report is ‘to enhance Departmental research profiles in anticipation of the REF’. The upgrading of the Office in Sustainable Reaction Engineering which is the subject of another Report today seems directed at the same objective.

These proposals will bring in strands of academic provision at a senior level which can be expected to affect the balance of the respective Departments for many years beyond 2015. It is true that in essence they merely bring forward replacements on the expected retirement of three current office holders (depending on the outcome of the forthcoming vote about academic retirement age, naturally), and that the cost to the University is merely the overlap cost of paying for two Professors instead of one for a year or two. However, making appointments with long-term implications to ‘beat the system’ when national higher education policy is so unstable and fast-changing seems to raise profound implications for policy-making in the University of Cambridge.
