Examinations, 2022

16 June 2022

As a consequence of the industrial action at other UK universities, there is a risk that External Examiners will resign from their examining duties at the University this year, potentially with insufficient notice to find replacements. The Council is submitting a Grace (Grace 1, p. 569) to enable class-lists to be accepted where examinations have been affected by such resignations and Examiners to include candidates on those lists under a wider range of headings that allow for later review. The Council hopes that it will not be necessary to use the emergency powers conferred by the Grace, but it thinks it a reasonable precaution to ensure that such powers are available.

Universities Superannuation Scheme

20 June 2022

Following the approval of Grace 1 of 21 April 2022, initiated by members of the Regent House, the Vice-Chancellor conveyed the Regent House's call for a new valuation of the Universities Superannuation Scheme (USS) 'as at 31 March 2022 if feasible' to the Chief Executive Officer of the USS Group (see the Council's Notice: *Reporter*, 6654, 2021–22, p. 432). The response notes that the USS has commissioned an Accelerated Year-End Review to provide further information about the scheme's funding position as at 31 March 2022. USS expects the outcome of that review to inform preparations for a 2023 valuation. Two amendments to General Board Regulations were omitted in error from Annex B to the General Board's Notice of 1 December 2021 (*Reporter*, 6640, 2021–22, p. 164). These changes remove references to the payment of travel expenses for Examiners, which are now covered in the Ordinance on Payments to Examiners, Assessors and Supervisors.

By removing Regulation 13 of the General Regulations for the degree of Master of Research (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 560) and renumbering the remaining regulations.

By removing Regulation 18 of the General Regulations for the degree of Master of Studies (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 567, as amended by Notice, *Reporter*, 6657, 2021–22, p. 494).

Appointments to certain offices in the Department of Chemical Engineering and Biotechnology

3 June 2022

The General Board has approved a change to the arrangements for making appointments to certain academic and academic-related offices in the Department of Chemical Engineering and Biotechnology. The changes noted below enable the Council of the School of Technology to constitute a Selection Committee on an *ad hoc* basis to make academic appointments other than to a Professorship. They also remove the requirement for a dedicated Appointments Committee for academic-related offices other than Technical Officers in the Department. Instead these appointments will be made by an Appointments Committee constituted by the Department on an *ad hoc* basis under the provisions of the Notice concerning the appointing arrangements for certain academic-related offices (reproduced in *Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 693).

By amending Regulation 2 of the General Board Regulations for the Department of Chemical Engineering and Biotechnology (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 633) to read as follows:

2. Appointments and reappointments to an academic office other than a Professorship in the Department of Chemical Engineering and Biotechnology shall be made by a Selection Committee constituted from time to time by the Council of the School of Technology.

By deleting the entry for the Selection Committee for the Department in the Notice concerning the appointing arrangements for certain academic offices (reproduced in *Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 695).

REGULATIONS FOR EXAMINATIONS**Preliminary Examination in Classics**

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, 266)

With effect from 1 October 2022

The General Board, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Classics, has approved the amendment of the special regulations for the Preliminary Examination in Classics to introduce more flexibility and better prepare students for Part IA of the Classical Tripos.

Regulation 3.

By replacing the existing text of Regulation 3 with the following:

3. The examination shall consist of four papers. Papers 1 and 2 shall each be set for three hours. Paper 3 shall be set for two hours. Paper 4 shall be assessed as a coursework essay.

4. Every candidate shall offer all four papers.

SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS

The Faculty Board of Classics gives notice of the following amendments to the Supplementary Regulations for the Preliminary Examination in Classics so as to introduce more flexibility and better prepare students for Part IA of the Classical Tripos.

PART IA

By replacing the existing text with the following:

Paper 1. Latin texts.

This paper will contain passages for seen translation, passages for critical discussion, and questions on linguistic structures.

Paper 2(a) and 2(b). Latin and Greek language.

This paper will contain passages for unseen translation, English-into-Latin sentences, and Greek exercise(s) appropriate to the level.

Paper 3. Classical topics.

This paper will contain questions on the following topics:

- (a) Greek and Roman philosophy
- (b) Greek and Roman history
- (c) Greek and Roman art and archaeology
- (d) Classical philology and linguistics

Candidates will be expected to answer two questions. No candidate may answer more than one question on the same topic.

Paper 4. Literary essay.

A single essay of no more than 2,500 words in length, including notes but excluding bibliography, on a literary topic related to a current set text. The topic is to be chosen from a list of titles to be issued by the division of Lent Term. The essays shall be typewritten, in English, and shall be submitted through the candidate's Director of Studies to the Director of Undergraduate Studies, in accordance with detailed arrangements approved by the Board, so as to arrive not later than 12 noon on the sixth Monday of full Easter Term.

Classical Tripos

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 299)

With effect from 1 October 2022

The General Board, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Classics, has approved the amendment of the regulations for the Classical Tripos so as to introduce an alternative mode of assessment, an alternative Latin paper and more accessible optional translation exercises into Greek and/or Latin.

Regulation 13.

By replacing the existing text of Regulation 13 with the following:

13. The examination shall consist of eight papers, each to be set for three hours, save for Paper 6 which shall be assessed as a portfolio of essays, as follows:

- Paper 1. Greek language and texts (also serves as Paper GL 1 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
- Paper 2A. Alternative Greek languages and texts (Option A) (also serves as Paper GL 2A of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
- Paper 2B. Alternative Greek languages and texts (Option B) (also serves as Paper GL 2B of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
- Paper 3. Latin language and texts (also serves as Paper GL 3 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
- Paper 4A. Alternative Latin languages and texts (Option A)
- Paper 4B. Alternative Latin languages and texts (Option B)
- Paper 5. Classical texts (also serves as Paper GL 5 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
- Paper 6. Classical essays
- Paper 7. Optional translation into Greek (also serves as Paper GL 6 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
- Paper 8. Optional translation into Latin (also serves as Paper GL 7 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)

Regulation 14.

By replacing the existing text of Regulation 14 with the following:

14. Every candidate shall offer: Paper 1 or Paper 2A or Paper 2B; Paper 3 or Paper 4A or Paper 4B; Paper 5; and Paper 6. In addition, a candidate may offer one or both of Papers 7 and 8. No candidate may offer Papers 2A and 2B or Papers 4A and 4B.

SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS

The Faculty Board of Classics gives notice of the following amendments to the supplementary Regulations for the Classical Tripos so as to introduce an alternative mode of assessment, an alternative Latin paper and more accessible optional translation exercises into Greek and/or Latin.

PART IA

By revising or inserting the titles and descriptions of Papers 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 with the following:

Paper 4A and 4B Alternative Latin language and texts

This paper will contain passages for unseen translation appropriate for candidates who had little or no knowledge of Latin before entry to the University and seen passages for analysis and appreciation from prescribed texts.

Paper 5. Classical texts

This paper will contain questions related to the prescribed texts. The paper will be divided into sections. Candidates will be expected to answer three questions. No candidate may answer more than one question from any one section.

Paper 6. Classical essays

This paper will be examined by the submission of two essays, each of no more than 2,500 words in length, including notes but excluding bibliography, on topics to be chosen from a list of titles to be issued by the Faculty Board by the division of the Lent Term preceding the examination. The list of titles shall be divided into four sections

- (a) Greek and Roman philosophy
- (b) Greek and Roman history
- (c) Greek and Roman art and archaeology
- (d) Classical philology and linguistics.

Candidates must choose one title from two sections. Candidates who have taken the Preliminary Examination must choose at least one title from a section on which they were not examined in the Preliminary Examination.

The essays shall be typewritten, in English, and shall be submitted through the candidate's Director of Studies to the Director of Undergraduate Studies, in accordance with detailed arrangements approved by the Faculty Board, so as to arrive not later than 12 noon on the fifth Monday of Full Easter Term. Candidates will be required to declare that the essays are their own work and that they do not contain material already used to any substantial extent for a comparable purpose. Where appropriate full and proper acknowledgement must be given to the work of others.

Paper 7. Optional translation into Greek

This paper will contain exercises for translation into Greek prose and verse, with some specified passages which may be attempted by candidates for Paper 2A and 2B.

Paper 8. Optional translation into Latin

This paper will contain exercises for translation into Latin prose or verse, with some specified passages which may be attempted by candidates for Paper 4A and 4B.

Economics Tripos

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 309)

With effect from 1 October 2021

The General Board, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Economics, has approved amendments to the regulations so as to suspend Paper 7 for Part IIB of the Economics Tripos in the 2021–22 academic year, as follows:

Regulation 19.

By inserting a footnote after Paper 7 *Public economics* suspending the paper for the 2021–22 academic year.

Digital Humanities for the M.Phil. Degree

With effect from 1 October 2022

The General Board, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of English, has approved Digital Humanities as a subject for the degree of Master of Philosophy by advanced study with effect from 1 October 2022. Special regulations for the examination in the subject have been approved as follows:

DIGITAL HUMANITIES

1. The scheme of examination for the one-year course of study in Digital Humanities for the degree of Master of Philosophy shall consist of:

- (a) Two essays, each of not more than 5,000 words in length (excluding bibliography, bibliographical references and appendices), on topics proposed by the candidate and approved by the Degree Committee for the Faculty of English;
- (b) *Either* a dissertation of not more than 12,000 words in length (excluding bibliography, bibliographical references and appendices), on a subject approved by the Degree Committee;
or a portfolio on a project approved by the Degree Committee. A portfolio shall comprise a dissertation of not more than 8,000 words in length (excluding bibliography, bibliographical references and appendices), and a project report of not more than 4,000 words in length (excluding bibliography, bibliographical references and appendices). The project report may include a methodological report and, with the approval of the Degree Committee, technical appendices that may comprise or include elements in visual, digital, or other formats. Candidates whose projects are collaborative shall each submit, in addition, a statement of not more than 500 words in length specifying their individual contribution.

2. The examination may include, at the discretion of the Examiners, an oral examination on the dissertation and on the general field of knowledge within which it falls, and on the other work submitted as part of the examination.

Economics for the M.Phil. Degree

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 538)

With effect from 1 October 2022

The General Board, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Economics, has approved amendments to the special regulations for the examination in Economics for the degree of Master of Philosophy to remove the dissertation, as follows:

Regulation 1.

By amending Regulation 1 to read as follows:

1. The scheme of examination for the one-year course of study in Economics for the degree of Master of Philosophy shall consist of three compulsory and four additional modules, selected from a list of core and optional modules published by the Degree Committee for the Faculty of Economics, which shall each be examined by written papers, projects or class presentations.

 - (iii) accept any amended list;
 - (b) the Examiners may, notwithstanding those Ordinances and the General Board Regulations for the examination concerned, include the names of some or all of the candidates under any of the following headings:
 - (i) Declared to have deserved honours: to be classified later.
 - (ii) Candidates successful in the examination: to be classified later.
 - (iii) Candidates on whom no decision has yet been reached because of insufficient evidence.
 - (iv) Candidates to whose names a distinctive mark may be attached in an amended list.
