The University Centre

The Council is providing the following information in response to questions from the Board of Scrutiny about the current and future use of the University Centre at Granta Place.

The University Centre was built to provide recreational and meeting space as well as catering facilities for those within the University community who did not have access to College amenities. The Report of the Syndicate on the Relationship between the University and the Colleges noted that there was 'no single focus for the life of the University as distinct from its Colleges' and that those University staff who were not Fellows of Colleges, and postgraduate research students, ought to have access to 'rooms for meetings and conferences, for occasions when the University gives hospitality, and for other needs' (*Reporter*, 4289, 1961–62, p. 1104).

The Ordinance for the University Centre (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 676) reflects those expectations, by entitling members of the Regent House, University officers and Fellows of Colleges, and postgraduate registered students to be members of the University Centre.

The University Centre, along with other buildings across the estate, was closed during the Covid-19 pandemic. This closure coincided with plans to undertake some internal refurbishment to provide more teaching space and operational accommodation within the building, and to relocate the central catering kitchen from the University Centre to the West Hub on the West Cambridge site. That work is now complete, and the University Centre has since re-opened, therefore space within the building remains available to members of the University Centre.

The building is now some 55 years old and in urgent need of comprehensive refurbishment. The current refurbishment works, including replacing the roof coverings, are to enable the continued productive use of the building pending agreement as to its future long-term use. A feasibility study will be conducted this year to evaluate options for future use of the building, and the outcomes from this work will be included within the wider Reshaping Our Estate programme, which will be submitted to the Council in due course. There will be a consultation as part of this work, which will include seeking the views of those entitled to membership of the University Centre about its future. If the Council, after considering the findings of the study and the consultation, supports permanent changes to the use of the building, it will publish a Report presenting those proposals for approval.

R. S. Whipple Fund

20 April 2023

Under Section 67 of the Charities Act 2011¹, the Charity Commission has power to change the purposes of a charity after having regard to certain matters. The Commission has agreed, after consultation with the Office for Students, to make a scheme to amend Regulation 2 of the Ordinance for the R. S. Whipple Fund (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 1031). The current purposes of the Fund do not provide a use for all of its income. The effect of the scheme (available on the *Reporter* website at https://www.admin.cam.ac.uk/reporter/2022-23/weekly/6697/WhippleFundScheme2023.pdf) is to widen the Fund's purposes so that, provided there are sufficient funds, the income of the Fund can be applied to support the offices of Director and Curator, and of Assistant Curator, of the Whipple Museum. The Council is submitting a Grace (Grace 1, p. 628) to amend Regulation 2 of the Ordinance to reflect the changes being made by the scheme. The Commission has agreed to seal the scheme, and therefore bring it into effect, on the date the Grace is approved (or very shortly thereafter).

Special Service to mark the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III

A special service to mark the Coronation will be held in Great St Mary's, the University Church, at 11.30 a.m. on Sunday, 7 May 2023. HM Lord-Lieutenant will be represented and there will be a Civic Procession. A procession of University Officers and Heads of Colleges will also take place. Other members of the University are also welcome to attend the service. Gowns are worn, graduates are invited to wear hoods, Doctors wear their festal gowns (6 and 7 May having been designated as 'Scarlet days') and apart from certain Officers, the dress of non-Cambridge degrees may be worn on this occasion. Those holding orders and decorations conferred by the Crown are invited to wear their insignia.
